

SCREWS AND WELDS

Rebbi Akiva Eiger says that if two items are screwed together, that does not render them as one utensil and b'lios do not pass from one of them to the other. An example of this is the floor of a home oven, of which most are typically only attached to the walls of the oven with screws (and sometimes are not "attached" at all). If something non-kosher or chametz falls onto that floor, only the floor becomes nonkosher and not the walls or ceiling. [Even so, the floor must be kashered before the oven is used for kosher]. Another example is a pot handle which is screwed onto the In that type of pot, ta'am cannot transfer from the pot to the handle; nonetheless, there are other reasons why the handle must be kashered as explained in Derech Kitzarah 45.

If, however, a handle, patch, or some other item is <u>welded</u> onto a utensil, then they are

considered bonded together to the point that they are now considered one utensil. As a result, *ta'am* transfers freely between the different parts, and they are viewed as being one item as relates to *kashering* as well.
