GLASS [PART 3 – APPLICATIONS]

The following are some examples of glass (in alphabetical order) where one may or may not *kasher*:

- Corelle is assumed to have the status of glass, although there are some who suggest it should be given the stricter status of cheress based on the assumption/possibility that some *cheress* is included in the formulation: see DK 54.
- Drinking glasses used by a kosher caterer for cold all year round but washed in a dishwasher with hot water, and now they would like to use them for Pesach; see DK 55.
- produced Fiberglass _ is by compressing strands of glass together, Belsky suggested and Rav that food/ta'am might get trapped between the fibers, and accordingly it should not be afforded the leniencies of glass.
- Glass stovetop (a.k.a. ceramic stovetop) - see DK 35.
- Microwave the glass plate in a microwave cannot be *kashered*; see DK 65.
- Oven door see "porcelain enamel" below.
- Porcelain enamel is glass fused onto steel, and generally it cannot be kashered. Therefore, the surface between the burners on a stovetop (commonly made from porcelain

enamel) cannot be kashered. However, an oven can be kashered with libun kal despite its interior being made of porcelain enamel (as is typical) and it having a glass door, since libun kal is an effective method of *kashering* glass; see DK 79.

- Pot cover made of glass cannot be • kashered.
- Sight glass is a small glass "window" built into a piece of equipment, such as a spray dryer, to allow the operators to see inside the equipment during processing. If the rest of the equipment is metal and can be kashered, the presence of the glass sight glass is assumed to not pose a concern. This is because any b'liah which does not come out of the glass is so minimal that it qualifies as כלי העשוי להשתמש בשפע; see DK 13-14.

CRCPOLICIES

- 151. What is the halachic status of the following items as compared to glass:
 - a. Fiberglass

Stricter than glass, and kashering is not effective even *b'dieved*

b. Pyrex?

More lenient than glass, and it can (and must) be kashered even l'chatchilah
