

CALCULATING AINO BEN YOMO [PART 1 – HOT WATER]

Kashering a utensil when it is aino ben yomo means that there are 24 hours between when it was used with non-kosher and hag'alah. In this installment and the next one we will consider two issues relating to ways the utensil might be used during those 24 hours and whether that affects the aino ben yomo status.

What if a pot was used for non-kosher at 9:00 AM on Sunday, and was then used to cook water (i.e., kosher pareve) at 10:00 AM? Does that cooking affect the required 24-hour downtime (since the pot was used) or should we say that since the water is kosher the status is not affected? In Yoreh Deah this is considered in the context of ChaNaN, and the implication is that in cases where ChaNaN does not apply aino ben yomo is calculated from the last time the pot was used for non-kosher (i.e., 9:00) rather than from the subsequent time when it was used for kosher (i.e., 10:00).

However, Yad Yehuda suggests that becoming "aino ben yomo" is a gradual process that begins as soon as the ta'am is absorbed into the pot. Thus, in our example, when water was cooked in the pot at 10:00, the non-kosher ta'am absorbed in the pot since 9:00 was already "1/24" pagum. However, that process will only happen while the ta'am is absorbed. But anytime the ta'am is out of the walls there is no degradation.

Therefore, (using our example) if water was cooked in the pot from 10:00 until 10:30, the process of *pegimah*/degradation was <u>paused</u> during that half hour since it was connected to (and possibly even extracted into) the water in the pot. The *pegimah* process starts once again at 10:30 and at that point it is already 1/24th *pagum*. Therefore, at 9:30 AM on Monday it will be *aino ben yomo*. The 24 hours of "aino ben yomo" are from 9:00-10:00 on Sunday (1 hour), and from 10:30 on Sunday until 9:30 on Monday (23 hours), with a "pause" from 10:00 until 10:30 on Sunday when the pot was hot.

However, it is noteworthy that (a) Yad Yehuda presents this position as the basis for disagreeing with rulings of Shach, K'raisi U'plaisi and others, and (b) this position is not recorded in earlier [or even later] Poskim which indicates that others did not assume this to be correct. Accordingly, Rav Belsky said that the common practice is not to be machmir for this opinion of Yad Yehuda.



CRC POLICIES

161. A pot was last used for non-kosher food at 9:00 AM on Sunday, then hot water was cooked in that pot from 10:00 until 10:30. Does the pot become *aino ben yomo* at 9:00 AM on Monday or at 9:30?

If it is a case where *ChaNaN* applies, the pot becomes *aino ben yomo* at 10:30

on Monday. If *ChaNaN* does not apply, the pot becomes *aino ben yomo* at 9:30 on Monday.
